One of the awards given by the Garden Club of America's Scholarship Committee is the Elizabeth Hull Abernathy Award. Every year

GCA bestows about 10 Hull Awards on men and women who "through working with children under 16 years of age in horticulture and the environ-



ment, have inspired their appreciation of the beauty and fragility of our planet."

MGC nominated Cathy Justis this year, and she won! Cathy has been the director of education for the Wolf River Conservancy since 2007. She works directly with children in K-12 through a variety of programs including frog chorus walks, stream strolls and service projects. She is also a certified Project WET instructor. She teaches instructors at all levels how to reach children with science-based water education.

In June Cathy was presented with a certificate and a check for \$1,000 from GCA.

Many thanks to Jeanne Arthur and Michelle Dry for writing letters of recommendation for Cathy.

In addition, Annalise Riekerk, a Rhodes College student, was awarded the Clara Carter Higgins Scholarship for Summer Environmental Studies by the GCA Scholarship Committee. She was to have studied flora and fauna over the summer in Namibia, but the project was canceled due to the pandemic.

FIELD TRIP TO VIEW JAPANESE ARBORETUM IN RIPLEY

Twenty-two club members traveled to Ripley TN on October 22 to visit a Japanese Maple arboretum in Ripley, Tennessee. Judge Joe H. Walker and his wife Danna told us the story of how they transformed (by themselves!), over a 30 year-period, their five-acre home -site on undeveloped land. Some areas had previously been used as landfill. It was a fascinating story of imagination, innovation, and unrelenting determination.

The couple purchased over 200 species of Japanese maples and have propagated many more, creating a landscape that evokes the calm and beautiful gardens for which Japan is known, including water features and large boulders. Danna is now adding moss to the landscape.



They gave us each a map that contained the location and species of each tree on the property. We also enjoyed a picnic and fellowship on the property.



Floral Design Tip of the Month

Water Tubes in a Pinch

How to Make Drinking Straw Water Tubes
This creative hydration solution by Christine de Beer
saved the day more than once.

When you want to add a tiny stem into a tiny space, make your own tiny water tube out of a drinking straw. It is especially suitable for orchids.

One *tiny* tube can keep a single orchid hydrated for days and can easily be topped off.

As Christine points out, not all drinking straws are created equal. There are fat ones and thin ones, strong ones and flimsy ones, ones that are clear and those that are colored.

Cut the straw to your desired size and seal one end with a drop of hot/cold glue. Be sure to check that the glued end is totally sealed.

Voila!... saved by the straw!
















The 2020 Conservation Study Conference will be held virtually November 17-18, 2020.
